രുള്ള Meet the Dancers By Katie Wood

Have you ever wondered how a particular dancer first discovered the good ol' RSCDS all those years ago? Or how they spend their time when they're not wearing ghillies? In this segment, editor Katie Wood explores what makes our fellow SCDers tick.

Henry Cobb

In this edition of Meet the Dancers, we actually get to meet the musician behind A&P's live piano music, Henry Cobb. Originally from Ontario and with experience in classical and jazz piano and indie rock, Henry settled in Montreal for his master's degree and the music scene. Now he's sharing his talent with us and learning a new musical genre that is richer and more complicated than he originally thought. Read on to learn more about Henry and what it takes to become a Scottish country dance musician.

Where are you from originally? I was born in Collingwood, Ontario, near the mouth of Georgian Bay, off of Lake Huron, but my mother was originally from Montreal, from an Irish family in Pointe-Saint-Charles.

How did you end up in Montreal? In 2016, I started my undergrad degree at Western University in London, Ontario, in classical piano. I followed an unofficial jazz strain there, too, which led me to want to do my master's in jazz. Especially for musicians, they say you should do your master's in the place you want to live, because by the time you finish it, you're already becoming established in the music scene there. Montreal was the obvious choice because I have family here and it's such a good scene for jazz, rock and roll, and indie, and it's an affordable place to live—or it was. I moved here four years ago, and I plan to stay for a long time, or at least while I'm somewhat youthful.

Do you speak French? Yes, I had to to go to the Université de Montréal. So I did a few exchanges before I moved here. I also dated a girl here for three years who was from France, and most of my friends are French speakers. So now I'm really comfortable speaking French.

So you're a professional musician? Yes, I finished my master's in 2022, and I play jazz sets. I also have my own indie rock project called Hank's Dream where I sing and play electric guitar and piano; you can find us on Spotify and Apple Music. In addition to that, I'm the organist/music director/choir director at St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church in St. Lambert. And now I play for Scottish dance.

Did you always want to be a musician? In high school, I was really into programming and building computers. I was taking private music lessons but not music classes in school. Then in grade 10 or 11, a friend asked me to be in his band, and I had lots of fun. It gave me a taste for what that life was like, and in grade 12 I decided to apply to for music programs at university. When I went to Western there was no more question in my mind; being at school for music was a transformative experience. And being a poor student gave me a taste of what the future would be like as a musician!

How did you start playing for Scottish dance? When I was doing my master's I got a job doing security at A&P. It's a really great job for students because while you are sitting at the front desk watching the door, you can do homework. I would bring my synthesizer and work on songs. While working, I would hear you guys having class. When I heard the recorded music, I wondered if there was any chance you'd want live music. At the same time, I probably had developed a bit of jazz arrogance and thought, I could probably play that!

So I got talking to Holly near the end of last year's session. She said I could come and audition. In hindsight, I'm not sure I did very well, but I was good enough that she saw my potential. Since then it's been such a cool journey to get to dive into what I didn't realize was a whole new system of music with all kinds of unwritten nuances. I didn't anticipate such a complicated and rich musical genre, and I'm still discovering and still have lots of things to improve on. Doing a 32-bar strathspey eight times through means, in effect, you are playing 16 pieces of music one after the other; it's easy to lose track of what you're doing. In a way, it would be easier to learn if there was a master/apprentice system and I could accompany someone more experienced and learn that way. But Holly has set me up with people who are masters of this music, even out of the country, who have helped me learn to do medleys, for example, which are my new favourite thing.

You did a medley for us the other evening, and it was great! We were impressed. So you're enjoying playing for SCD? I'm very much enjoying playing with everyone, and it's been so cool to discover a whole new style of music that's so rich in unwritten things, stylistic things that you can't ascertain unless you listen, read about it, play it, and see the dances. Classical music is like that in a lot of ways, and jazz even more so. The more I do SCD the more I see so many similarities between it and the jazz medium. Jazz music was not made to be written, and often it wasn't. Both jazz and SCD make use of reduced scores, lead sheets with melodies and chords that leave out a lot of detail that is up to the musicians to know how to fill in. When I signed up to play for SCD, I didn't imagine such a sophisticated tradition with so much to learn.

So the short answer is yes, I'm enjoying it. It's also keeping my fingers in shape, making sure I don't just lean into the way I like to do things and slack off on other skills. So I'm very much enjoying it, not to mention the fact that everyone is super nice.

Do you yourself do any forms of dance? Have you tried Scottish dance? No, I haven't. I'm not exactly shy of dancing, but maybe compared to other aspects of my life, I'm somewhat shy in this area.

What is something surprising or interesting that people might not know about you? When I was 10, I got a pen knife in my stocking at Christmas. When I was using it to open my first gift, it got stuck on the tape, slipped, and cut one of the main tendons in my left hand. I still have a huge scar, which includes the four-centimetre cut from the knife plus a three-centimetre cut perpendicular to that because they had to expand upon the original cut during a big, complicated surgery to fix the tendon. It's interesting because if they hadn't been able to repair it, I could have lost my career!

Well, there you go. Now people will come up to you to see the scar and then you can talk and get to know one another better!
